

The Kindle uses wireless Internet connections to allow a consumer to shop for, select and download books, newspapers and magazines that are in digital format. A Kindle 2, released in 2010, has the capacity to hold 4Gb of memory, or about 3,500 books. Those who read on Kindles are able to download books from the comfort of their homes, offices or anywhere they find themselves needing a book. The ability to carry thousands of books in a device that weighs less than a pound is remarkable and allows readers to store an extensive collection. A Kindle owner can keep reference material, books for pleasure, business manuals and reading material for friends and family on a single device that fits easily into a backpack, briefcase or purse. E-books are available for purchase and download as gifts, and Kindle book gift cards can be purchased so that a recipient may make personal choices. Kindle e-readers use a 6-inch screen with a muted light grey background and dark grey text called E-Ink Pearl. The graphics on a Kindle are also in grayscale. The lack of an LCD-based backlight system results in less eye strain for users than traditional desktop, laptop or notebook monitors. Kindles have undergone upgrades, but newer versions do not make previous models obsolete. Each new Kindle can receive transferred between the two devices. Doing so will help them develop to their highest academic potential and embrace reading literature. A key cognitive benefit of reasoning skills. Tweens typically believe that there is "one truth" in the world that is not affected by personal biases or perspectives. They accept information that is provided to them by experts — including parents and teachers — and that they themselves experience with their own senses. This type of reasoning is less advanced than that of older teens and twentysomethings, who realize that truth is relative and varies from person. According to a paper published in The Reading Teacher, characters in Newbery Medal-winning books can help tweens progress in their ability to reason. These main characters face cognitive and/or moral dilemmas that surpass the types of dilemmas, the characters must actively move from lower-level to higher-level reasoning over the course of the book. This process models the development of reasoning skills for tween readers in a natural and engaging way. Finally, reading literature can expand a tween's emotional range. Quality literature naturally extracts a variety of strong emotions from readers — including rage, heartache, and loss. Some of these emotions may never have been previously experienced by the tween. Therefore, reading literature gives tweens an opportunity to grapple with and process strong emotions in a safe setting without feeling overwhelmed by the emotions. This helps to prepare them for future real-world situations — like the death of a grandparent or serious illness in a friend — that will elicit similar strong reactions.

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
